Carpet Renewal Fund Drive

The carpet at Pilgrim Lutheran Church is 35 years old and showing its age. It has become outdated, scraggly and the tears in it have tripped more than one person. It is time for it to go! Our council has initiated a fund drive to pay for the cost of replacing it in stages and has earmarked \$10,000 in savings toward this project. Estimates have placed the total cost at approximately \$40,000.00. This will be broken down into three phases. We will complete each phase as funds permit. **Phase I:** Fellowship Hall floor and wall & hallway from the Narthex to the Fellowship Hall. The carpet in this area is the worst. The projected cost for Phase I is \$16,500. Phase II: Narthex, Sanctuary, Offices, Alter and Communion Rails- The carpet in this phase, while outdated, is in fair shape. The projected cost for this phase is \$17,500.00. Phase III: Classrooms & Library-The projected cost for this phase is \$6,000.00.

We can reduce some of these costs by removing and disposing of the old carpet ourselves. Money donated to this renewal effort should be considered second mile giving over and above our regular tithes.

From your Pastor:

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

You made it! You have survived a whole year under my pastoral leadership! I began my time among you officially on March 1st of last year and here we are again, one year later. The building is still standing and worship is still going on week after week faithfully. I wonder if there is some kind of irony that my one year anniversary with you also marks Ash Wednesday and the beginning of Lent.

All through the month of March and halfway through April we will be in the church season of Lent. Some people call it a Lenten Journey and I have wondered about that. We don't really go anywhere. If Lent is a time to remember when Jesus was in the wilderness for forty days, why do we think he was on a journey? The Bible doesn't say that. It says, "Then Jesus was led up by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. He fasted forty days and forty nights, and afterward he was famished." (Matthew 4:1, 2) It says nothing about a journey.

I understand the Lenten fast; that is a good spiritual discipline, but I don't understand what the journey part is all about unless people are trying to compare their Lenten journey to the wilderness wanderings of the Israelites, which took forty YEARS, not forty days. Did you know the main reason the exodus of the Israelites took so long was because of their disobedience to God? I don't think that is something I want to aspire to, so I would encourage us to not compare our Lenten season to some kind of journey. What are we leaving? Where are we going? There is so much going on where we are right now that leaving seems contrary to good sense. For instance, right now the weather is warming and people are beginning to think about gardening. Right now there are people planning to participate in the community wide clean up to get ready for the Sandhill Crane Festival. Right now there are good discussion groups going on around the church with Men's Breakfast Book Study reading "Making Sense of the Cross" every Saturday morning at 8am at Casa Mexicana and the Women's Gather Bible Study which now meets at Coventry House at 10 am one Saturday each month. (This month it will be on the 18th). There is also an Adult Forum Bible Study that meets each Sunday morning and we are taking a slow read through the book of Acts. Lots of good discussions come from those groups and more voices in the discussion can only make the discussion better, so please consider spending some of your Lenten season with one of those groups.

Oh, by the way, if you are looking for something to give up for Lent, I recommend you give up worry. As Jesus asked, "Can any of you by worrying add a single hour to your span of life? But strive first for the kingdom of God and his righteousness." (Matthew 6:27 and 33) See you in worship! Peace, Pastor Don
